



## **BUSH RE-ELECTED; EARTH BLOWS**

A post-election lava formation inside Mount St. Helens' crater has bulged upward approximately 330 feet and is growing at the rate of 7 to 8 cubic meeters every second, while another volcano beneath Iceland's largest glacier erupted spouting clouds of black and white ash.
