Berlin Votes to Expropriate 240K Apartments from Corporate Landlords

Residents in Berlin, Germany, sick of skyrocketing rents voted recently to "socialize" 240,000 homes by taking homes from the city's biggest corporate landlords and transfering them to public ownership.

"A lot of them have been sitting empty for years," commented one Berliner whose t-shirt read, "Decommodify Housing."

"Speculative investments in real estate markets have driven rents beyond affordability, making housing an investment game with no actual housing benefits for people with real housing needs," stated one housing expert watching the speculative market spiral in awe. "This is great stuff for the wealthy, or for people who play Monopoly for real."

The definitive 56% to 39% vote margin was the result of a campaign by the Deutsche Wohnen & Co. Enteignen (Expropriate Deutsche Wohnen & Co.), which gathered 343,000 petition signatures to ensure the measure made its way onto the ballot

"Gentrification gets a bad name," stated Barry Simple, spokesperson for Berlin's largest corporate landlord. "We provide an essential service by upgrading the types of people who rent. Our renters are less likely to wear unsightly clothing, or raise objec-

tions to rent increases."

"The statistics are fascinating," offered another lobbyist for corporate housing concerns. "High-end renters have better cars, longer vacations, and just seem to enjoy life more fully."

Organizers hope sustained pressure on Berlin's elected officials will pressure the city to pass a law that turns the plan into reality, making high-end housing proponents snort their luncheon Blackberry Champagne Mules.

"We have very secure arrangements with cooperative politicians," murmured one official on condition of anonymity. "Planning is no place for democracy."

Berkeley Bucks Redux: Coupons for the Wealthy Campaign Takes Off



Previous Failure of "Berkeley Cares" Coupons No Obstacle to City of Berkeley's Enthusiasm for Fake Money

"It starts here'?" puzzled one local resident over the City of Berkeley's latest use of public funds to promote alternatives to money, which can too easily be used to help pandhandlers and poor people dampening the holiday spirit by making themselves absurdly visible during holiday time.

"We've removed the 'help the poor' component," explained a nervous spokesperson for the city's Economic Development Department. "This is just straight up from taxpayers to the rich with no stops along the way."

John Caner, the apparently eternal director of the Downtown Berkeley Association which represents property owners as opposed to actual merchants, admitted that previous efforts to encourage people to avoid direct charity had failed.

"The little mailboxes, the scrip coupons, nothing really stopped people from giving money directly to the poor, which was always the real goal. Nothing functions as simply as money. Which is why this campaign's charitable target is us. We feel

we've suffered enough."

"Wealthy property owners have suffered during the pandemic," acknowledged a spokesperson for the city. "And they really know how to make their voices heard."

The Berkeley Bucks eGift Card is apparently available at participating locations in the city, but which locations and for what products is usually the hitch that makes for long lines during a hectic shopping trip.

"You couldn't buy diapers," remembered one recipient of a Berkeley Cares coupon from only a few years ago. "They buried that program so deep because of their embarrassment I never thought it would come back, but I guess the rich are just less likely to need diapers and baby wipes."

"We call it 'Giving The Gift Of Berkeley" stated the spokesperson. "We just hope the Berkeley Bucks Gift Card can get these wealthy people off our back. Otherwise you know they'll be back with some other taxpayer-funded charity for the wealthy. That's what sells in this town.'

and lives in Houston, so the resemblance is uncanny.


