Dear Lena, so we can care about Israeli babies but not Palestinian babies? How weird is that?



Watch out for the black hole in Berkeley. It is big enough now so that if you are driving in Berkeley, you might drive into it, to disappear for the next billion years.



District 7 Councilmember Rigle Robinson's proposal to legalize bike riding on pedestrian sidewalks arrived on the City Council agenda November 7, 2023, and will swiftly pass through what's left of Berkeley's commissions.

"Nothing keeps me in better shape as a disabled senior than attempting to safely evade the parade of whizzing skateboards, bicycles, scooters, and unicycles which have taken over the sidewalks in my neighborhood," whispered one elderly resident trapped against a downtown wall amid a whirl of oblivious bicyclists.

Drivers nationwide are also more awake now that respect for ordinary rules of the road are long gone.

"I don't want to kill anybody," stated one driver. "But for bikes there are no rules."

Councilmember Robinson, who dreams of becoming Berkeley's next mayor, commented at his recent anti-ADA rally that Berkeley needed to step up its support for two-wheeled travelers.

On September 19th, a thirty-oneyear-old musician on a racing bike struck a fifty-eight-year-old mother in Central Park. The accident took place at 4:30 in the afternoon, in total daylight. The victim, Jill Tarlov, died three days later, on Monday, of severe head trauma. The N.Y.P.D. said that the bicyclist, Jason Marshall, had swerved to avoid a group of pedestrians before crashing into Tarlov. Following Tarlov's death, Marshall said that it was "an unavoidable accident." It has not yet been determined how fast he was going, and he has not been charged with a crime.




