Berkeley's Top Priority: Threatening, Out-of Control Sidewalks

TERRIFYING SIDEWALKS CAUSE CHAOS for downtown pedestrians who tearfully beg for more sidewalk regulations.

"This can't go on," cried tear-stricken pedestrians fleeing hulking expanses of sidewalks lurking throughout commercial districts just waiting to trip and possibly rob helpless local citizens as they try to get to work or school. "We need more sidewalk rules, and we need them now!"

Sidewalk experts acknowledge that the

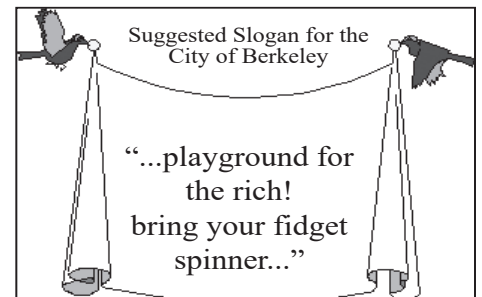
Critics agreed that women's tendency to cooperate is a terrible disadvantage.

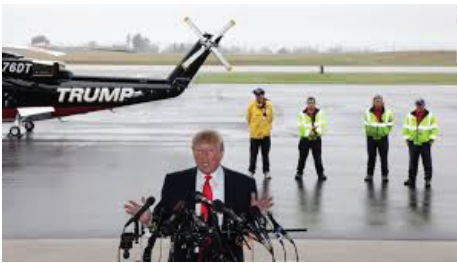
Other tourists expressed appreciation that the alert had taken place at such a convenient moment in the morning.

Facebook Promises to Become Meaningful
