Experts note that while only around 2,000 grizzlies still exist in the continental United States, Canada and Alaska have at least 25,000 most of whom have filled out applications to join the radical wildlife movement to assure their rights to appropriate habitat with a generous medical plan.

"We may be off by a few thousand," admits Wildlife Permits administrator Yolanda Bigfish. "We base our population estimates on hair-snagging, mark-and-recapture, plus the new habit of using Sharpies to sign the trash cans they root through. Some of their poetry is very powerful.'

#### **How to Save the World**

A Simple, Useful Formula from Professor Anita Lottmore



nign standard which poses engimatic difficulties for people whose occupations requrie numbers, proof, studies, or science.

'Studies take time," pointed out one fired worker previously from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association. "Musk's team appears to be inexplicably favored above numbers, proof, names, basic factual foundation of any kind."

Professor Lottmore's work in the early 1900's offered multi-dimensional and instantaneous responses to oblique pronouncements from what were, in those days, simply considered bullies.

"Bullies enjoy routine," Lottmore's thesis plainly states. "As unexpected as their soliloquys are, bullies' oratory is usually born of small, isolated drinking groups in fraternities or country clubs. These groups are completely vulnerable to a composed, deadpan, but oblique verbal angle."

"President Zelenskyy held his ground, which plays well with everyone except Trump and Vance," stated Professor Graham. "But at some point Zelenskyy could have shouted, 'Squirrel!', and pointed outside the room. Both Trump and Vance would have immediately jumped up and run, providing an equally theatrical diversion. Lottmore had excellent such skills, and utilized them in faculty meetings."

Professor Graham noted that Lottmore's techniques were often transactional, suggesting that President Zelenskyy could have offered. fpr instance, to name some buildings in Ukraine after Trump.

"He appears to really enjoy that," commented Professor Graham. "Either that or a plate of cheeseburgers."
