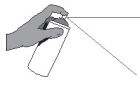


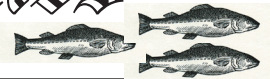

## ARTS COMMISSION CHAIR REVERSES STATEMENT Supports Flier Destruction

David Snippen, current chair of Berkeley's Civic Arts Commission, remains livid over the public revelation that he apologized for the previous Arts Commission chair's destruction of hundreds of protest fliers.

His public apology for Sherry Smith's bizarre vandalism, witnessed by dozens of people watching in bewilderment as Smith rampaged up and down Addison Street, has apparently become a political embarrassment.

"I don't remember it that way," he responded when confronted by the fact that his apology was made on a public street in front of witnesses. "I think this has had enough attention."

Snippen wrote a letter to a local newspaper denying his apologetic moment ever took place, and accusing the flier writer of coming from a "privileged" background.

"Rural Appalachian heritage and an upbringing in East LA has its own cache," conceded the flier writer. "There is a certain privilege in having intimate knowledge of what most people consider to be a slum."

Snippen protested that his assumption about the flier writer's "privileged" background was a natural assumption given the quality of the writing, and declined an opportunity to apologize.

"Distortion of the facts is okay if I do it," he clarified. "Ad hominem attacks are fair if they keep me on the A list."

The Civic Arts Commission has not bothered to distance itself from the hearty endorsement of flier destruction given by its current and previous chair.

"It goes without saying," offered one observer. "The best way to muzzle artists is to offer them money. Even an embarrassingly small amount of cash is enough to maintain political silence in the curious acoustics of the 'arts district'."

Religious experts marveled when Salinas Police Chief Daniel Ortega was found to have quoted directly from promotional materials for stun guns while defending their use.

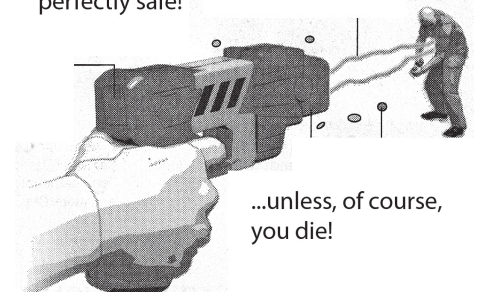

"When we can imitate this religious and moral sincerity we'll have a hope of connecting with them," stated one observer.

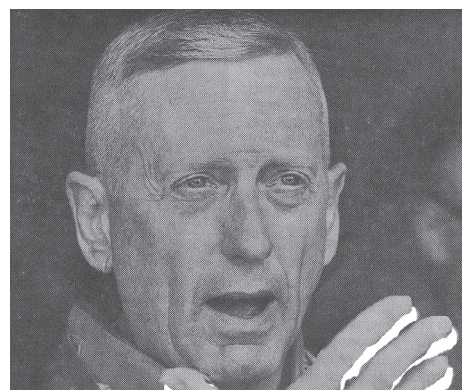
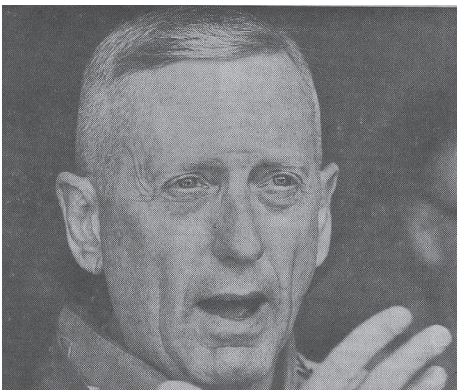
Local politicians joined the fray, passing municipal resolutions denouncing the marchers' political cause.

"This is much easier than filling potholes," explained one local representative, "and around here it's much safer than crossing the street."

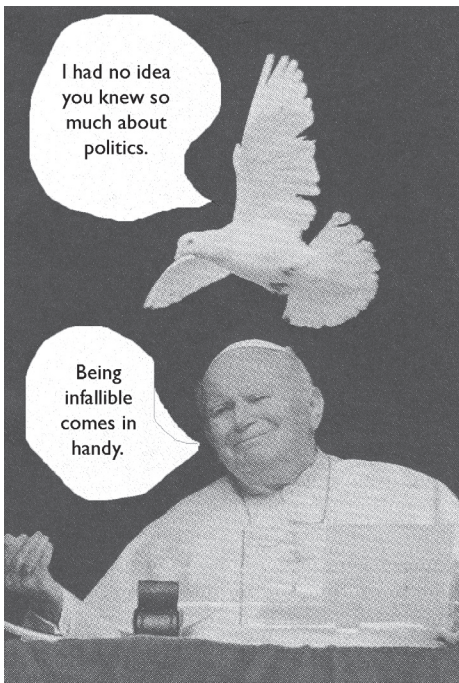

Library patrons are less than enthusiastic about the tracking system being installed at the Berkeley Public Library which will automate checking out books and enable the library to lay off at least 12 employees.

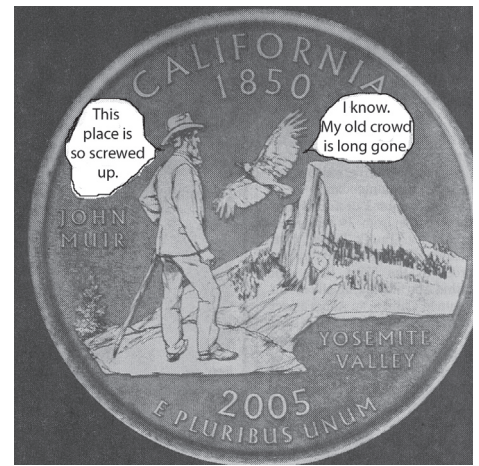

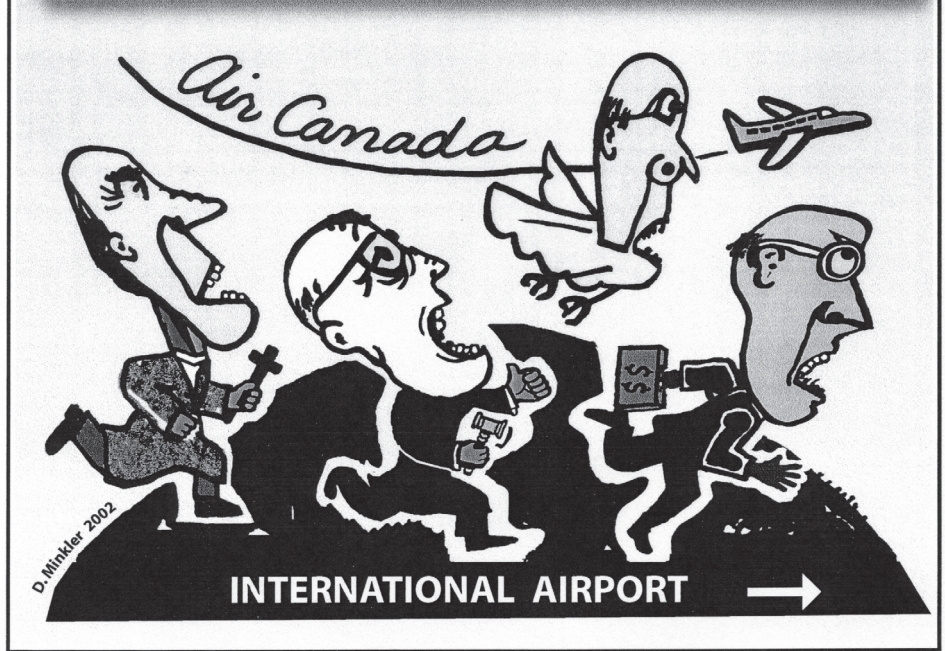

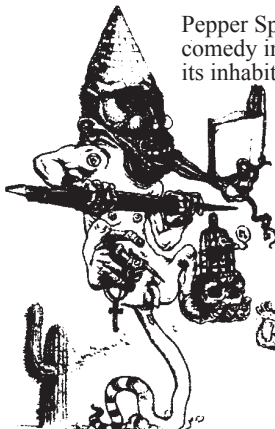
