

NASA Wins War on the Moon



THIS LOOKS LIKE WATER to excited NASA scientists, and most school children have agreed to humor them.

NASA fired a two-ton empty rocket into a moon crater hoping for a high plume of moon rocks, evidence of hoped-for water, or at least a visual display impressive enough to keep the thousands of school children watching the live video stream from wondering what the point was.

"We're at a bit of a disadvantage," acknowledged Anthony Colaprete, the LCROSS mission's chief scientist. "These kids have played a lot of video games. We have trouble competing with Halo 3 and GameShark.'

Critics gently applauded NASA's ability to hit the moon at all, given the low success rate of most missions, but pointed out that pointlessly blowing up the moon was not the best argument for continuing to fund the agency during difficult economic times.

"The moon is a pretty peaceful place," stated one critic trying to locate the impact flash on the video. "Maybe they should just acknowledge that there's no water there and leave it alone."

But scientists insisted that the flash at impact could be evidence of sodium in the crater or possibly other elements, and announced that they will spend days if not weeks and years identifying and interpreting the vast possibilities.

"It's either that or look for real work," stated one scientist, "which right now is hard to find.'

nected agricultural interests, and were merely misunderstood.


"Some of them are my best friends," stated one supporter. "They love lightbulb jokes, and often are the only ones who stay to clean up after a party."

State agricultural officials disagreed, although acknowledging that the moths' tendency to roll themselves in leaves during the larval stage and live in tiny microclimates posed a challenge.

"We may need some invasive techniques," conceded one official. "We may need to break down some doors."

Dear reader, I recommend less invasive techniques, but would be interested to see your proposal, which should prove most popular.



UC Campus Golf Course Proposed as Big Money Maker

In a move designed to harness both innovation and tradition to offset budget cuts, University of California (UC) President Mark Yudof announced that the flagship UC Berkeley campus will

1) Updating the list of Emergency Coordinators and emergency contacts in the Contingency Plan to include a bunch of people who can scream louder in an emergency.


2) Updating organizational charts throughout the document to insert one faceless bureaucrat for another.


