Occupy Halloween Refuses to Leave

Pumpkin Patch "A Mess" - Police Threaten Pie



THE OCCUPY WALL STREET movement has become so infectious it has inspired "Occupy Halloween" which has the most incomprehensible demands of any of the occupy groups and are the hardest to handcuff.

While other Occupy Wall Street supporters are caving in to police pressure and the elements, Occupy Halloween vows to continue its unique protest in fields and pumpkin patches causing consternation among authorities who have all but given up trying to communicate with the group.

An Open Letter to the Citizens of Oakland from the Oakland Police Officers' Association

We represent the 645 police officers who work hard every day. We, too, are the 99% fighting for better working conditions. We get paid around \$35 an hour to shoot you, and when we shoot you we do it with professionalism and impunity.

As your police officers, we are confused. On Tuesday, October 25th, we were ordered by Mayor Quan to clear out the encampments at Frank Ogawa Plaza. We performed the job, knowing that protests have resulted in rioting, violence and destruction of property, and that civil rights are a thing of the past.

Then, on Wednesday, October 26th, the Mayor allowed protesters back in – to camp out at the very place they were evacuated from the day before. It is all very confusing to us. We just want to make sure we shoot the right people.

Last week's events alone cost Oakland taxpayers over \$1 million. We're not calculating in the medical costs to the marine we shot in the head or the court costs to come when we settle his civil suit against us.

So do we keep shooting people or not? All of these mixed messages are confusing.

We love Oakland. We love our jobs. And we love shooting people. We really need practice with all the new Homeland Security stuff, like pepper spray and rubber bullets. We respectfully ask the citizens of Oakland to join us in demanding that our City officials, including Mayor Quan, make sound decisions and take responsibility for these decisions. Oakland is struggling – we need real leaders NOW who will step up and lead – not send mixed messages. Thank you for listening.


sued eviction notices to Occupy Oakland protesters outside Oakland City Hall camping in Frank Ogawa Plaza citing sanitation and safety issues, creating no small amusement among the Occupy Oakland protesters who ignored them.

"With all due respect to Oakland Mayor Jean Quan, and even considering the scuffle or two we've had here, it would be a little silly to suggest that this is most dangerous part of town," smiled one camper sweeping out her tent. "Quan just recently identified the most dangerous blocks in town as part of her safety campaign, and this isn't one of them."

Mayor Quan was invited to go on doing her job while the protesters did theirs.

Nonetheless, some Occupy Oakland protesters planned to pack up and leave when the pressure comes down from City Hall to move along.




