

DBA to Replace Real Homeless People with Robots

Responding to customer complaints that the Shattuck Avenue shopping experience was becoming too "mall-ish", the Downtown Berkeley Association (DBA) has hired puppeteer Fred Ables to re-populate the downtown area with robot homeless people according to enthusiastic DBA Director John Caner.

"After spending so much of the citys coin getting these people [the homeless] jailed and banished to the darkest corners of the county we just *couldn't* bring them back. That could be construed as compassion. Nothing worse for business than that."

Mr. Ables is working on a number of models. "We have two versions of shopping cart people out there now, and five sitter models with four more models on the drawing board," Ables enthused.

Molly Topkins of Northside Berkeley had this to say: "I'm a vegetarian.... and I always was really disgusted...by the fact that these people.....take the money people give them...and they buy these super cheap hamburgers!.... I mean it's so obvious! You see them sitting there....right in front of

McDonald's!"

Nic Batthurt of Kensington opined, "I felt really silly deliberately ignoring people when I went downtown for a drinky or two. But with these new mechanical homeless, I feel free not only to stare right at them but to make the snide clever remarks I am so good at! Heck I can even spit on them without reprisals! This is genius. It has released years of pent up aggression in a lot of people! On the way home from Jupiter, I often forget they are robots and hit on them!...You don't have to print that part!"

According to DBA records, hitting on them in a variety of ways has been a problem. In the last year the agency has had to ask the city of Berkeley to pay thousands of dollars to repair the robots after they have damaged by "over enthusiastic" citizens.

"People will come around to realizing that these robots are costly and can't mend up in the bushes, like the real homeless." Caner laughed.

The DBA is relieved to have non-problematic robotic replacements for the usual people they've spent years discouraging








Neanderthals' Messy Cave Proves They Were Capable of Complex Behavior

Archeological experts are certain that newly discovered circles of stones found deep inside a French cave in Bruniquel are about 176,500 years old and indicate complex behavior patterns perhaps unintelligible to modern society.

"We can't make sense of it," sighed one archeologist holding a photograph of the complex, arguably organized patterns of stalagmites up to sixteen inches high laid out in oval patterns in the cave." Is it a mess? Or is it an exotic pattern that we are not yet advanced enough to understand?"

"Perhaps it is some kind of game," suggested another archeologist photographing shards of carefully arranged broken rocks. "It might be an ancient version of Angry Birds or Minecraft."

Experts agreed that the assemblage of stalagmites could not have come about by accident and showed evidence of early human

cooperation notably absent in the social patterns of modern human behavior.

"We have the potential to learn a lot

from this phenomenon," stated Jacques Jaubert of the University of Bordeaux, France.




